The Right Rev Dr Michael A Barry, Moderator of the General Assembly, led in public worship and addressed those present before constituting the Assembly with prayer.

The Clerk reported that the names of 624 ministers and 452 commissioned elders have been entered on the Roll, together with 44 Assembly Elders, Conveners and nominees of the General Assembly Nominations Committee. In addition, 188 people have been invited to sit and deliberate, 16 of whom are from other Churches.

BUSINESS COMMITTEE

1. MEMORIAL RECORD

Memorial Record

The Rev Samuel McMillan BA, Minister Emeritus of Caledon and Minterburn Congregations in the Presbytery of Armagh, died on 18th May 2015 in the eighty-fifth year of his age and the fiftieth year of his ministry. He was born at Belfast on 13th October 1930 the second of three siblings, two boys and a girl, to Samuel McMillan, a Lamplighter, and his wife Agnes, née Hunter. Raised in connection with the Congregation of Newington, in North Belfast, he was educated at Hillman Primary School and later Shaftesbury House Tutorial College, Belfast. On leaving school he worked in Mackie's and then as a Shipping Clerk with the York Street Flax Spinning Company for several years. Responding to the call of God to the ordained ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland he attended Magee University College, Londonderry, in 1957, followed by Trinity College, Dublin, graduating BA in 1961. He pursued his theological studies at the Magee Theological College, Londonderry (1960-1961) then at Knox College, Toronto, Canada (1961-1962) which is affiliated to the University of Toronto, where he also served with the Canadian Home Mission for five months. He completed his course at the Assembly's College, Belfast (1962-1963). He served his assistantship with the Rev Samuel McKinley in Glengormley Congregation from 1963 to 1966. During this period he was licensed by the Presbytery of North Belfast on 23rd February 1964 and ordained by the same Presbytery on 16th September 1964. Having a heart for missionary work he was installed to missionary service in Malawi under the Board of Foreign Missions at a Service held in Newington on 4th September 1966. He served with the Church of Central Africa, Presbyterian, teaching Bible knowledge, firstly in the Henry Henderson Institute, a secondary school in Blantyre named after a Scottish missionary, then in a secondary school in Zomba, followed by his appointment as Bursar and Assistant to the Director of the Chilema Lay Training Centre, Blantyre. Having contracted malaria he came back to Ireland resigning from missionary service in 1971. On 21st November 1971 he accepted a call from Saint Columba's Presbyterian Church, a Congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Southern Africa in Lusaka, Zambia. He came home again in 1972 and on 7th November was placed under the care of the Presbytery of North Belfast as a Minister without charge until his call to the united charge of Caledon and Minterburn Congregations in County Tyrone, where he was installed on 2nd May 1973 by the Presbytery of Armagh. There he exercised a faithful pastoral and pulpit ministry though not enjoying good health. He retired on 8th April 1992 and settled again with his home Congregation of Newington on the Limestone Road, Belfast. We assure Mr McMillan's brother John, his sister, Grace, and the wider family circle, of the sympathy of the General Assembly and our appreciation of their brother's service to Christ and his Church.

2. The Church of Ireland General Synod (2015)

The Very Rev Dr Rob Craig reports:

- 1. The General Synod of the Church of Ireland was convened in Armagh from 7th-9th May 2015. The opening service of worship, a Communion Service, was conducted in St Patrick's Cathedral, after which the business of Synod was conducted in the Armagh City Hotel. Joining with me in representing the Presbyterian Church in Ireland was Mr Kenneth Belshaw, a ruling Elder from the Congregation of Hill Street, Lurgan. This year's Synod was a new triennium, meaning that many of the delegates were new to the Synod, its ways and processes.
- 2. Along with the visiting delegates from other Christian denominations we were warmly and graciously received. Of particular interest was the representation not only of a local representative from the Moravian Church but also one of the Bishops from the Moravian Church in the UK. Given the Covenant arrangements with the Methodist Church in Ireland, the Church of Ireland has been opening a similar conversation with the Moravian Church.

- 3. In his Presidential address, the Most Rev Dr Richard Clarke, Archbishop of Armagh, spoke of the Church as a living organism which is "always and everywhere relational". He emphasised the "dignity of difference" speaking against the "homogenisation of society".
- 4. Archbishop Clarke highlighted to the members of Synod the "scale of the missional challenge" facing the Church of Ireland revealed in the statistical results of a survey of the attendance at Sunday worship which had been conducted in November 2013. The survey revealed that in attendance at worship were 58,000 worshippers; only 15% of the total membership of the denomination. He further reported that only 13% of the attendees fell into the 12-30 age bracket. The Archbishop posed the challenge to the Church to find the characteristics of the appropriate episcopal ministry in the light of such a survey.
- 5. The agenda of the Synod was very full and some of its business was of a routine nature. Of particular note, however, were three items of business. First, there was the proposal, in the form of a position paper, to reform the procedure regarding the election of Bishops. In addition the Synod received and debated an important report regarding its Diocesan boundaries and the need for a re-structuring to the boundaries. Any re-structuring would be significant for Congregations and Dioceses within the Republic of Ireland where the membership is smaller and the boundaries greater than in Northern Ireland. When the report regarding Education in both jurisdictions was received I was pleased to take the opportunity to acknowledge the role played by the Rev Dr Ian Ellis in Northern Ireland. I also acknowledged and thanked the Church of Ireland for her on-going support and care for the future of the education of all children, especially Presbyterian children, within the Republic of Ireland.
- 6. Given that the Synod was meeting just two weeks before the Referendum in the Republic of Ireland regarding the proposed change in the Constitution to permit marriage between two persons of the same sex strong opinions and feelings were expressed on the matter in the debate on the third day. The Synod also received a written report from its Select Committee on Human Sexuality in the Context of Christian Belief. The Committee has not completed its work but has proposed that it will complete the production of a Guide for the assistance of the Church and also a Study Guide for use in Diocesan or Parish groups.
- 7. As with all such Church gatherings alongside the formal business meetings there was plenty of opportunity to renew friendships and make new friends around the meal table and over coffee.

COUNCIL FOR CHURCH IN SOCIETY

The Report of the **COUNCIL FOR CHURCH IN SOCIETY** (Reports pp213-229), was submitted by the Very Rev Dr TN Hamilton, together with the following Supplementary Report:

With the exception of the Poverty and Social Deprivation Task Group, all Task Groups have held their inaugural meetings. The Community Relations and Reconciliation and Dealing with the Past Task Groups met on 5th May to consider their remits and forward work plans. These will be formally agreed at their next meetings.

The Council is increasingly concerned by the continuing difficulties, at the time of writing, in relation to the impasse around welfare reform in Northern Ireland and the resulting threat to the stability of the devolved institutions. Whilst

the Council shares many of the concerns expressed about the impact of welfare reform, it believes that the consequences of the current political deadlock for the wider budget are also having a detrimental impact on the most vulnerable in our society. Difficult decisions must be taken to move beyond the current impasse and to create space for further discussion about how to achieve the most just and fair distribution of our limited resources.

A statement was issued by the Council Convener on 19th May in response to the County Court Judgement in the case of Lee (Gareth) v Ashers Baking Co Ltd and Colin McArthur and Karen McArthur. It is attached as Appendix E. The statement expressed concern about the outcome of the case and reiterated the Council's call for an informed, gracious and comprehensive discussion about the role of conscience in the public square.

The Council Convener, Public Affairs Officer and Press and Web Officer met with representatives of the Republic of Ireland Presbyteries to agree a public statement on the same sex marriage referendum. This statement was released on 22nd April and is attached as Appendix F. On 23rd May it was announced that the people of the Republic of Ireland had voted in favour of introducing same sex marriage by 62% to 38%. The Council Convener issued a statement in response to the result, which is attached as Appendix G.

On 4th May, the Council submitted its response to the Department of Culture, Arts and Leisure's Consultation on proposals for an Irish Language Bill. This is attached as Appendix H.

APPENDIX E

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH'S 'PROFOUND CONCERN' OVER ASHERS' RULING

(Issued on 19/05/2015)

Speaking in response to today's ruling in the case of Gareth Lee v. Ashers Bakery Limited at Belfast County Court, the Very Rev Dr Norman Hamilton, Convener of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland's Council for Church in Society said, "Today's ruling should profoundly concern everyone who wants to live in a genuinely pluralist society.

"The owners of Ashers Bakery consistently maintained that the issue for them lay with the message they were asked to produce and not with the customer. Yet in a deeply disturbing development, businesses will now be compelled to produce materials or messages, even if they are incompatible with their owners' deeply and reasonably held beliefs.

"Such levels of state control are surely contrary to the freedoms and liberties that we should seek to uphold out of respect for the worth of every person and for the common good of society.

"In light of today's judgement, it is clear that the law needs to be changed. In a truly pluralist society, the law should protect everyone from discrimination, while properly valuing the role of conscience. No one should be treated as a second class citizen, as we are all created with equal worth in the eyes of God.

"This is why as a Church we have stated that we want to see the concept of 'reasonable accommodation' developed in law. This would achieve a better way for people of all faiths and none to manifest their beliefs in the public arena, which includes the business world.

"Whilst we recognise that this case has been a lengthy and painful experience for all of those directly involved, and troubling for wider society, we believe that there is an urgent need for an informed, gracious and comprehensive discussion about the role of conscience in the public square.

"No doubt we, along with many others, will be giving further consideration to this judgement and its implications in the days ahead."

APPENDIX F

REFERENDUM: CHURCH UPHOLDS HISTORIC VIEW OF MARRIAGE

(Issued on 22/04/2015)

With one month to go before 22nd May's historic constitutional Referendum on Marriage in the Republic of Ireland, the Presbyterian Church has published its position on the Referendum.

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland upholds the historic – and Christian – view of marriage as exclusively between one man and one woman. We affirm that it is needed for the common good of society.

In recognising the rights of all people within a democracy, we must include the rights of children, and the natural responsibilities of a father and a mother in their nurture. We believe the change proposed in the referendum denies these rights.

A redefinition of marriage would establish new norms within our society, the implications of which have not been fully explored.

We acknowledge that this is an intensely emotive subject and trust that all will engage in the debate with gentleness and respect as we approach the Referendum.

APPENDIX G

STATEMENT BY THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN IRELAND ON THE MARRIAGE REFERENDUM RESULT

(Issued on 23/05/2015)

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland has issued the following statement on the result of the Marriage Referendum in the Republic of Ireland today.

Commenting on the result the Very Rev Dr Norman Hamilton, Convener of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland's Council for Church in Society said, "We are deeply disappointed and saddened that the Constitution will no longer reflect the historic – and Christian – view of marriage that it is exclusively between one man and one woman; the position the Presbyterian Church in Ireland upholds and maintains.

"The issue before voters was an intensely emotive one and to express the historic view of marriage during the referendum campaign often brought hostility and rejection. We hope that those who continue to uphold this view will not be marginalised or demeaned. We would also encourage all Christians to love their neighbours – as the Bible calls us to do – particularly those with whom we might disagree and if demeaned, to turn the other cheek, for Jesus' sake.

"While the result is a significant change for Irish Society, as a Church we will continue to reach out to all people, whatever their situation, as all are equally welcome.

"Whilst reaffirming our understanding of marriage as exclusively between one man and one woman, we pray for wisdom for the Government and urge it to consult faith groups over the coming months as it formulates the necessary subsequent legislation."

APPENDIX H

RESPONSE OF THE COUNCIL FOR CHURCH IN SOCIETY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN IRELAND TO THE DEPARTMENT OF CULTURE, ARTS AND LEISURE'S CONSULTATION ON PROPOSALS FOR AN IRISH LANGUAGE RILL.

(Submitted May 2015)

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland has over 230,000 members belonging to 545 Congregations across 19 Presbyteries throughout Ireland, north and south.

The Council for Church in Society is authorised by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland to speak on behalf of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland on matters of public policy. We welcome the opportunity to respond to the Department of Culture, Arts and Leisure's (DCAL) Consultation on proposals for an Irish Language Bill. This response reflects our current thinking on some of the issues raised in the consultation document. We do not directly address each of the proposals but wish to make the following comments:

- We recognise that many in our society regard the Irish language as a key part of their cultural heritage and identity.
- As Presbyterians, we acknowledge the important role played by the Irish language in our history. Indeed, it is often said that Presbyterians helped to save the Irish language. Historically, many spoke it as their first language, or as a language they learned to socialise and trade with their neighbours. Moreover, Presbyterians were to the forefront of Irish language revivals and some became experts, developing language resources and using Irish as a medium for conducting church services. The Irish language remains highly valued by many in our congregations today.
- We want the Irish language to be properly respected and valued by those who do and do not speak it. A central and significant challenge in this regard is depoliticising its use. DCAL needs to set out clearly and

- in detail how this is to be achieved in our society, which remains highly polarised.
- 4. We welcome the increasing interest in learning Irish across our society, believing that better understanding of our shared heritage can contribute to building a stronger and more united community.
- 5. The Northern Ireland Executive has a role in protecting and promoting the Irish language. However, to achieve the above aims, language policy must be constructed realistically and effectively: policy makers need to give thorough consideration to the way languages are perceived and used, and the effects of their use on our divided society.
- 6. We believe that the group of proposals in the consultation document does not represent the most appropriate and effective way forward and even risks devaluing the Irish language in the eyes of many across Northern Ireland.
- 7. With regard to the public administration aspects, for example, we are concerned that negative attitudes towards the language will increase if there is considerable expenditure on bureaucracy, such as translating documents that are rarely or never accessed, or an openended commitment to the use of Irish in tribunals or courts, potentially necessitating simultaneous translation.
- 8. On place-names and signage, we acknowledge that languages have great potential to make a positive contribution in helping to promote and enjoy our shared heritage. However, we emphasise that this is a difficult, complex and controversial issue. Any action in this regard would need to be measured and considerate of the risk of exacerbating societal division.
- 9. Evaluating the potential and actual impact of language policy is complicated due to the difficulty in establishing straightforward causal connections between the pursuit of various policy options and outcomes for language development. However, we would question whether the apparent 'top down' approach of many of the proposals is the most appropriate in the current context.
- 10. The influence of public administration and bureaucracy is arguably less personal, direct and effective than opportunities to learn languages at home and through inclusive engagement at community level.
- 11. With the vast majority of the population having little or no ability in Irish, we suggest that it would be more appropriate to focus on the provision of learning programmes and resources that support and encourage the use and enjoyment of the language in our community.
- 12. Linguistic diversity can form part of a healthy and vibrant civic society. The learning of languages can also create better understanding between people from different backgrounds and traditions, promoting community cohesion. We are therefore open to further consideration

of how legislation could positively contribute to the protection and development of minority languages in our society, though we recognise that this challenge is not specifically within the remit of DCAL. We would be very willing to meet the Minister and engage with the Committee to discuss this issue further.

GENERAL COUNCIL **Section B** of the Report of the **GENERAL COUNCIL** (Reports pp13-19), along with resolutions 5-7 (Reports p52) was submitted by Mr John Hunter CB, together with the following Supplementary Report:

Charities Legislation Task Group - Supplementary Report

- 1. Following a meeting of Charities Legislation Task Group on 13 May further information has been sent to the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland to prepare for the forthcoming registration process. Following consultation with the General Assembly Solicitor proposed Public Benefit Statements have been prepared for The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, Presbyteries and Congregations. The Commission has indicated broad agreement with these statements, which are appended in full. If approved by the General Assembly and finally signed off by the Commission this will assist Presbyteries and Congregations in particular with registration as they will be able to use these approved statements rather than having to prepare their own. A resolution is appended asking the Assembly to approve the statements and give power to the Charities Legislation Task Group to make any necessary minor amendments. Members of Assembly should note that these are not mission statements nor detailed theological affirmations, but are statements set out in the required format for the purpose of fulfilling the legal requirement of charity legislation.
- 2. The proposed Code Changes in relation to charity trustees (see Reports pp53-55), have also been forward to the Charity Commission for any comments. In the light of the discussions two slightly amended overtures for Pars 35 & 70 of the Code are included in the Supplementary Report Booklet.
- 3. The Charity Commission have asked the Church to forward copies of the constitutional documents in relation to Presbytery Education Boards so that they can consider whether they will be required to register. Following

consultation with Presbytery Clerks it became clear that Presbytery Education Boards were established under the "Educational Endowments (Ireland) Act 1885" with various schemes being set up for each Presbytery. It appears on a review of the various schemes that they are all similar in content. Therefore rather than sending the Commission a copy of all scheme one has been selected and forwarded. As Education Boards primary role is to act a "holding trustees" for congregational property it is hoped that they will not be required to register and any issues arising can be dealt with through either Presbytery or congregational registrations. The Panel await a response from the Commission on this matter.

- 4. In the General Assembly Reports p14 it refers to one of the Charities being the "General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland". The panel now recommend to the General Assembly that this be changed to the "Presbyterian Church in Ireland".
- 5. The Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008 make provision for designated religious status which provides limited exemption from certain requirements of the Act. In particular Section 66 to 68 of the Act do not apply to designated religious charities. It has come to the Task Group's attention that the legislation relating to designated religious charities has not yet been commenced and that it may indeed be the end of 2015 before it is. This matter has been raised with the Minister for Social Developments and in correspondence with the Charity Commission. As a result, the Commission has assured the Minister that no decision will be taken regarding the registration of Presbyterian churches until the Commission is in a position to also decide on designated religious charity status. The Church however will still be called forward to prepare for registration.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN IRELAND

Public Benefits

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from this purpose include:

- 1. Provision of a forum for Public worship.
- 2. Pastoral care (including for the sick, disabled and bereaved).
- 3. Spiritual and moral development.
- 4. Provision of Counselling.
- 5. The protection of children and vulnerable adults.
- 6. The promotion of Christian values.
- 7. The delivery of Christian service.

- 8. The presentation of the teachings of the Bible along with opportunities for appropriate response.
- 9. The production of appropriate literature and associated material in physical and digital formats.
- 10. Making available activities that seek to promote an understanding of Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms), through practical expression of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community.
- 11. Engagement with and support for individual Christians and other secular and Christian organisations and charities in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland and abroad.
- 12. Engagement with and support for secular organisations and charities which are in accord with the ethos of the Church in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland and abroad.
- 13. The Training of Ministers, Elders, Deaconesses, Youth Workers, Family Workers, and volunteers which is necessary in order to further our advancement of religion charitable purpose and which enables and enhances the delivery of most of the other benefits.
 - 14. The provision of third-level education.
 - 15. Service on Controlled Schools Boards of Governors.
 - 16. Residential Services.
 - 17. Organised events such as Summer Camps and conferences.
 - 18. Ministry to the following specific groups:
 - a. Children
 - b. Young people
 - c. Students
 - d. Young adults
 - e. Women
 - f. Men
 - g. Families
 - h. The Armed Forces
 - i. The elderly and infirm
 - j. Those in hospital and receiving other forms of healthcare, including physical and mental health
 - k. Those with hearing impairment and other disabilities
 - 1. Those with addictions
 - m. Those with learning difficulties
 - n. Prisoners
 - Ex-offenders

Generally the above benefits are delivered locally by Presbyteries, Congregations and members, but some are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in nearly all cases. The benefits are made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, social media and in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

What your organisation does

(A) CENTRALLY

Comments on matters of public importance from a Biblical perspective.

Makes statements on church policy relevant to the public domain.

Maintains relationships with local, regional and national governmental institutions.

Makes representations to regional and national governments and responds to consultations from them on relevant issues, including all aspects of public policy including education, youth, children's, social and ethical issues.

Develops relationships with other Church bodies and Christian charities.

Develops relationships with secular organisations and charities.

Develops relationships with civic society.

Monitors those inter-church bodies of which the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is a member.

Provides nominations to education and other state bodies where the Church is a stakeholder.

Selects, trains and develops full and part-time ministers.

Offers pastoral care to its officers and their families.

Selects and trains deaconesses.

Maintains and Manages Union Theological College, a third-level institution and a recognised College of Queen's University, Belfast.

Provides a Conciliation Service for its members.

Resources Presbyteries and Congregations in worship; discipleship, nurture and teaching; pastoral care; evangelism and outreach in the community, including social outreach; co-operative working with others; involvement in global mission; leadership, including elder training; building supportive links with local schools; supporting Christians in the workplace; being proactive in the work of good relations.

Enables the development of youth and children's ministry; Presbyterian Women and ministry among women generally; young adults' ministry; support for the family (including PCI Family Holiday); marriage and counselling services.

Provides support for local Congregations in finance, health and safety and personnel issues; disability awareness; Taking Care (the protection of children and vulnerable adults).

Develop strategic priorities in all-age mission in Ireland.

Enables new church development and church planting.

Oversees the deployment and on-going support of Deaconesses.

Supports a chaplaincy service in the Forces, Healthcare and Prisons.

Supports mission and ministry in Universities and Colleges through chaplaincy services.

Oversees various designated funds of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland.

Undertakes Overseas Mission, including partnership with overseas Churches and sending personnel.

Promotes world development issues, including providing for an annual appeal.

- 1. **Mr Alastair J Rankin, BA (Mod)** was appointed General Assembly's Solicitor from 1 November, 1993, in succession to Mr Robert NC Watts, BA, LLB. He qualified as a solicitor in the Supreme Court of Justice in Northern Ireland in 1977 and became a partner and then director in Cleaver Fulton Rankin in 1980 and 1997 respectively.
- 2. He soon became a familiar figure at the Assembly rostrum and in the offices and meeting rooms in Assembly Buildings, where he was assiduous in attendance at many meetings of various Boards, Committees and other bodies, all of which benefited from his long experience and thoughtful advice.
- 3. He has specialised in trust work, conveyancing, wills, probate, taxation and pensions and his legal expertise has been invaluable, particularly in his role as Convener of the Commission on Trusts.

The Rev Dr WJP Bailie, Mission Africa, reports:

1. Mission Africa (The Qua Iboe Fellowship) is one of Ireland's oldest mission agencies. We look forward with humble yet confident expectation to the years ahead, praying that God might continue to be pleased to use the mission for His sovereign purposes.

2. The mission concentrates on four areas of ministry: evangelism and church planting; the strengthening of existing church bodies through theological education; medical mission; and compassionate ministry, especially amongst disadvantaged and abused children. These ministries are carried out in

partnership with various evangelical African denominations, and often with likeminded western mission agencies.

- 3. The mission continues its work against a background of financial challenge, an ever-diminishing interest in foreign mission amongst western churches and at a time when many within the church cannot adequately distinguish mission and aid and development work. Nevertheless, we continue to send out full time missionaries. We continue to operate a short-term programme of teams and medium term placements. We also continue to operate branches in Scotland and England. Mission Africa is a member of Global Connections (Evangelical Missionary Alliance) and Mission Agencies Partnership. I am particularly pleased to report a close working relationship with BMO now CGM.
- 4. As Chief Executive I have responsibility for strategic planning; pastoral care of missionaries; administration of personnel and finance; partner relations with a variety of Churches and agencies, and I am particularly involved in promoting theological education in Africa.
- 5. I am also grateful to be able to record that my status as a Minister in recognised service permits me to play an active role within my Presbytery (Ards) and in the Council for Training in Ministry. I am particularly glad to serve the Church through part-time teaching at Union Theological College and participation in the Accredited Preacher and Auxiliary Ministry Schemes.

The Rev Dr Ruth Patterson OBE, Restoration Ministries, reports:

- 1. Over the past year in Restoration Ministries the work of spiritual direction and prayer continues. We also facilitate reflection days corresponding with the different seasons of the Christian Year. The movement of Faith and Friendship, which comes under the umbrella of Restoration Ministries, has expanded in the last couple of years with groups now meeting in Moira and the Glenavy/Crumlin area.
- 2. For the 18 years of its existence, I have been writing the scripture guidelines and it is encouraging to know of people's interest and commitment. The major part of my time is taken up in preparation and travel, both around Ireland and further afield. In so doing we seek, in all humility, to share with other people and places what we have experienced and learned over the years. These engagements are either in the form of conferences or retreats. It is an enormous privilege to be asked to walk alongside people in this way.
- 3. Our interest in and involvement with Centering Prayer has been a huge gift and challenges us on our journey of faith. The invitation to unity that can best be defined as diversity embraced by love is one of the heartbeats of what we seek to live.
- 4. Once again, my sincere appreciation to all of those who support us prayerfully and financially.

The Rev John Peacock, Acting Centre Director for the Centre for Youth Ministry Ireland, reports:

1. I can report another successful year for the Centre for Youth Ministry Ireland.

2. This year our fourth cohort of students graduated, giving a total of 67 graduates to date, and I am pleased to report that, as in previous years, almost all are working in the areas of ministry.

BELFAST, 2015

- In September 2015 there will be a further 20 new students joining the programme, giving a total of 51 students currently studying across the three year groups. While we remain in partnership with Belfast Bible College, from this date all CYMI classes will be held at our Youth Link training and resource centre on the Springfield Road. We believe this will help create an enhanced sense of community amongst CYMI students and allows more flexibility in our teaching pattern.
- CYMI now has graduates working in Australia, North America and England, though the majority have remained in Ireland, particularly Northern Ireland. While most graduates remain in youth ministry roles some use the skills developed in other contexts. The fact that at every level we seek to encourage and enable students to inter-relate theology and youth work theory and apply both to their practice contexts means that our graduates should be well prepared to minister in a wide variety of roles.
- 5. The course seeks to provide an intentional environment where students (whom we regard as missionaries in training) can develop their awareness of a maturing Christian character, youth work skills and the qualities and skills that enable them to minister with competence in a variety of contexts, particularly focused on young people in the age range 4-25.
- 6. In this past year we have welcomed students who have transferred from other youth ministry and youth work courses in Scotland and England as well as Ireland as the reputation of the quality of the qualification continues to grow. We continue to be grateful for the support of PCI Churches that recognise the value of the course and are prepared to provide a placement for the student to undergo training, while they in turn experience the benefit that a student can bring to their ministry amongst young people.
- 7. The training of students for ministry and mission is a very labour intensive process and over 100 people are actively involved in teaching, supervising and supporting the students on the course. We have an excellent team of quality module tutors, who are mostly practitioners, with expertise in their particular area of teaching. As a result we are able to integrate theology, youth work theory and practice into every aspect of the course.
- Once again I wish to record my thanks to the large number of Presbyterians who have supported the development of this work in the last 12 months through prayer and encouragement as well as those who have worked as module tutors, professional practice tutors or line managers in Congregations who have provided practice contexts for our students.

The Rev DH Thompson outlined the theme 'Your congregation, its life and witness' and spoke on how the Council is seeking to go about its work in its early days.

Dr Connor spoke on the subject of 'Fruitful Congregations'.

Members discussed in small groups the question 'What might faithfulness look like in your congregation?' and texted in answers which appeared on a screen.

A panel facilitated by Mr Thompson and consisting of the Revs Jane Nelson, Colin Morrison and Dr Mark Welsh reflected on 'Fruitfulness in a range of contexts'.

Using coloured cards, members gave feedback on 'Where are you most seeing signs of fruitfulness in your congregations – Breadth, Depth, Length?'

Dr Graeme Thompson interviewed Mr Owen Wilson and Miss Hayley Cullen (SPUD) on 'developing congregational life and witness in relation to developing young leaders and stimulating interest and involvement in global mission'.

Dr Connor and Mr Thompson introduced video clips and facilitated interviews on 'Resourcing congregational fruitfulness' with Revs Angus Stewart (Convener, Discipleship Committee) and Morris Gault (Minister, Cooke Centenary); Mrs Valerie Stewart (Convener, Presbyterian Women's Strategy & Coordination Committee) and Dr Graeme Thompson (Youth Development Officer).

Intermission

The alternative presentation by the **COUNCIL FOR CONGREGATIONAL LIFE AND WITNESS** continued.

Mr T Finnegan introduced the Fit for Purpose theme for 2015/16, 'A Caring Fellowship' and showed a connected video clip.

Mr Thompson spoke on 'Developing Congregational Pastoral Life – Core, Community & Care'.

2. Auxiliary Ministry

Since the publication of the General Assembly Reports for 2015, representatives of the Union Commission met, at their request, with representatives of the Council for Training in Ministry because of the Council's concerns that the draft guidelines for the Auxiliary Ministry seemed to preclude a full-time Auxiliary Ministry post. This was never the intention of the Union Commission (although the report of the General Board in 2010 report did, at that time, refer to the Auxiliary Ministry scheme as part-time). The Union Commission desires that flexibility characterise the scheme and that, while accepting that the majority of such posts are not likely to be full-time, the possibility would still exist that such a post could be full-time. Therefore the following changes to the draft guidelines on Auxiliary Ministry (Reports, Appendix 3, pp 152-155) have been made.

Paragraph A2: Delete and substitute —

An Auxiliary Minister is a Minister of the Word, normally part-time, and should not be confused with others who may exercise a ministry which can be described as part-time in nature, e.g. Stated Supply or under Par 81(3) of the Code, or the 'Scheme for Part-Time Ministry of Word and Sacrament' as also approved by the General Assembly in 2010. Part-time will normally mean up to 20 hours per week.

Paragraph B4: Delete and substitute -

Both forms of Auxiliary Ministry may be on an expenses only or remunerated basis, but Congregational Auxiliary Ministries will normally be expenses only. Auxiliary Ministry posts are only open to those not already Ministers of Word and Sacrament.

Paragraph C7: Delete and substitute —

The Kirk Session must specify the following:

- the hours to be worked normally the frequency of preaching, leading Bible studies etc. and any pastoral duties. Account will need to be given to time for preparation;
- whether the post will be established on an 'expenses only' or on a 'remunerated' basis and what it proposes by way of expenses and, if appropriate, remuneration. Changes in remuneration will normally take place at review, but application can be made to the Linkage Commission at any time;
- what particular arrangements will be put in place where there is more than one Congregation involved;
- the period of review by Presbytery, which will normally be three years. (The Linkage Commission will not normally be involved in these reviews.)
- any other necessary matters e.g. holidays, other supplies etc.

Paragraph D4: Delete and substitute —

The Presbytery or Council must specify the following:

- the hours to be worked normally the frequency of preaching, leading Bible studies etc. and any pastoral duties. Account will need to be given to time for preparation;
- whether the post will be established on an 'expenses only' or on a 'remunerated' basis and what it proposes by way of expenses and, if appropriate, remuneration. Changes in remuneration will normally take place at review, but application can be made to the Linkage Commission at any time;
- the relative responsibilities, if any, of the Presbytery and/or Council in the arrangement;
- the period of review by Presbytery or Council as appropriate, which will normally be three years. The Linkage Commission will normally be involved in these reviews;
- any other necessary matters e.g. holidays, other supplies etc.

GENERAL COUNCIL **Section D** of the Report of the **GENERAL COUNCIL** (Reports pp26-29), along with resolutions 14-18 (Reports p52) was submitted by the Rev AD Davidson, together with the following Supplementary Reports:

1. Support Services Committee

(i) Actuarial Valuation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) as at 31 December 2014

The Support Services Committee, through its Finance Panel, received from the Trustees of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) the preliminary actuarial valuation of the Scheme as at 31 December 2014. In summary this showed that

- (a) there has been a significant increase in the number of pensioners and therefore the Scheme is maturing.
- (b) the Scheme's asset allocation is currently split 80% growth assets (equities and property) and 20% matching assets (corporate bonds and gilts).

- (c) there is a shortfall or deficit of £11m on a technical provisions basis, which is down from £31m in 2011. On the neutral estimate basis, which removes allowance for prudence in respect of investment returns, the shortfall was £3.5m. On a buy-out basis, which represents the cost of securing the benefits with an insurer, the shortfall was £82m. The main reason for the reduction in the shortfall is investment outperformance and deficit reduction contributions paid by the Church. The fall in gilt yields since 2011 has had a negative impact on the result.
- (d) the employer contribution rate for future benefit accrual (i.e. excluding deficit contributions), death-in-service benefits, expenses and Pension Protection Fund levies is 20.8% (compared to 17.3% at the 2011 valuation). The increase arises from lower gilt yields.
- (e) no allowance had been made for discretionary pension increases within the initial results on the pre 1997 non-GMP (Guaranteed Minimum Pension) element of pensions in payment. The "one-off" cost to the valuation result of granting a 1% increase would be approximately £234,000. No increase has been applied to this pension element since 2002.

The Scheme Trustees sought the Scheme Employers view on two proposals to grant a 5% discretionary pension increase in respect of pre 1997 service.

(ii) to reduce the employers contribution rate from 27.5% to 24% with members continuing to contribute 7%.

At a meeting of the Support Services Committee on 30 April, and acting on authority delegated by the General Council, it was agreed to support the Trustees intention to grant a 5% discretionary pension increase in respect of pre 1997 service and to reduce the employer's contribution rate from 27.5% to 24.0%. Both changes to be implemented from 1 January 2016.

(ii) Rate of assessment for The Pension Scheme Fund

The Pension Scheme fund collects an assessment from congregations towards the "employer's" pension contributions and for 2015 it is proposed that the rate of assessment is 27.5% of the stipend paid to the minister during the year. The Support Services Committee will consider the rates of assessment for 2016 for all assessment funds at a meeting in October 2015 with a recommendation being made to the General Assembly in June 2016. With regard to the Pension Scheme Fund assessment it is expected that the rate would be set at 24% of stipend for the 3 years 2016 to 2018 in line with the results of the actuarial valuation of the pension scheme.

2. Nominations Committee

The Committee met on 27th April 2015.

Nominations for the Judicial Commission were drawn up and are included in the revised nominations booklet for approval.

Deletions, alterations and additions to the membership of the Councils and Committees have proved necessary for various reasons. A very small number of positions have not been filled because some Presbyteries and Councils have not been able to identify suitable people willing to occupy them. The finalised membership, insofar as the positions have been able to be filled, of the

Commissions, Councils and Committees is shown in the revised nominations booklet and is submitted for approval.

The Committee considered a process for replacing members as vacancies occur. It proposes that direct Presbytery nominees be replaced by the Committee through the year on receipt of new nominations from Presbyteries, as there will be no question of refusing a valid direct Presbytery nomination. A resolution is appended to give the Committee the authority to do this. It does not feel that it can take the same approach with positions that are filled by 'Other Nominees' (those nominated to the 'pool' by Presbyteries, PW and SPUD along with others sourced elsewhere) and will bring the names of those to fill vacancies in this category to the General Assembly following the occurrence of the vacancy. When a vacancy for a Convener occurs during the year the Council may appoint an Interim Convener from within its membership: the Nominations Committee will then advertise and interview for the post and make a nomination to the General Assembly following.

The Committee will seek to devise a process for replacing members of Councils and Committees who come to the end of their appointment terms, and for replenishing the pool of nominees from Presbytery, PW and SPUD.

MODERATOR'S ADVISOTY COMMITTEE The Supplementary Report of the MODERATOR'S ADVISORY COMMITTEEE (GENERAL COUNCIL) was submitted by the Rev TD Gribben:

- 1. Following the result of the recent marriage referendum in the Republic of Ireland, and urgent questions being raised by some Ministers in that jurisdiction, the Moderator's Advisory Committee held a special meeting on Wednesday 27th May 2015. The Convener invited some Ministers from the Republic of Ireland, along with some others whose input would be useful, to sit and deliberate with the Committee.
- 2. The Committee recognised that the Church and Society Council has had, and would continue to have, a significant ongoing involvement in presenting the views of the Presbyterian Church in the public square on this and related matters. It was however agreed that the specific issue of the Presbyterian Church's involvement in the solemnization or registration of marriage went beyond the remit of that Council.
- 3. The Committee heard from representatives of the southern Presbyteries regarding the deep sense of unease and concern felt by many Ministers. The Committee identified two presenting issues, namely:

The need to make unambiguously clear the position of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland with regard to what PCI Ministers cannot do in this area:

The need to set up a focused task group to look at the issue of the Church's ongoing involvement in the solemnisation or registration of marriage.

- 4. The Committee therefore unanimously agreed to present the first two resolutions (appended below) for consideration by the General Assembly.
- 5. The Committee were made aware that the Council for Church in Society would be reporting to the General Assembly regarding wider related issues. The Committee, in line with discussion at the Council the previous evening, recognised that there was a clear need to encourage a greater emphasis on the biblical understanding of marriage and family within our Congregations. In light of the fact that the Council for Congregational Life and Witness would not be meeting prior to the General Assembly, and following consultation with the Secretary of that Council, the third resolution (appended below) is presented for consideration by the General Assembly.
- 6. Finally, the Committee also recognised its own responsibility, as previously agreed by the former General Board, to give leadership in the whole area of relating to the LGBT community, in its different manifestations. The Committee undertook to seek to take this area of work forward during the incoming session.

The final Report of the **GENERAL ASSEMBLY BUSINESS COMMITTEE**, along with resolutions 19, 20 & 21 (Reports pp52f) were submitted by the Very Rev Dr RA Patton, together with the following Supplementary Report:

BUSINESS COMMITTEE

The Church of Scotland General Assembly (2015)

The Rt Rev Dr Michael Barry Reports:

- 1. I attended the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, in Edinburgh 15th-22nd May 2015, with my Chaplain, the Rev Dr TJ McCormick, and our wives, together with Mr Stanley Bond, my Clerk of Session. We received a warm welcome and enjoyed generous hospitality throughout our visit.
- 2. The week began with the splendid pageantry of a reception in the Palace of Holyroodhouse, which included the ceremonial presentation of keys of the City of Edinburgh to Her Majesty's Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly, His Grace, Lord Hope of Craighead. At the first session of the Assembly His Grace was formally introduced and addressed those present with warmth, and gentle humour.
- 3. The Rev Dr Angus Morrison was installed as Moderator in succession to the Rev John Chalmers who will be resuming duties as the Assembly's Principal Clerk. On Saturday evening the out-going Moderator gave an extensive report on his work during the year. Reflecting on many experiences throughout Scotland and beyond he took the opportunity to identify and suggest future agenda items for the Kirk.
- 4. The theme of the Assembly 'Living Stones' was fully used and well developed throughout the week, even the 'Blue Book' carried the branding. It also provided the theme for Daily Devotions and Sunday worship in St Giles Cathedral. A range of resources has been provided for personal and congregational use with the aim of developing the theme during this year. All of this is indicative of prayerful consideration, imaginative and creative work, and enthusiastic promotion. We trust that it will be a source of blessing to all who use the material.
- 5. Sunday was a stimulating mix of the formal and informal. The service in St Giles Cathedral, during which the Moderator preached, had all the hallmarks of a state occasion. Being a fluent Gaelic speaker the Moderator went on to conduct a second service, in Gaelic, at The Greyfriars Kirk. The afternoon had a different style of pageantry when the Princes Street Gardens were filled with stalls displaying

the work of the Church at all levels. Some Congregations show-cased particular projects, Presbyteries displayed special events, Councils provided information on their areas of responsibility and other Missions and Agencies advertised their work. The afternoon concluded with an open-air service which was well attended by all ages. The event works under the title 'Heart and Soul' – it was clear that many had indeed put their heart and soul into it.

- 6. Dr Morrison chaired the business meetings of the Assembly with engaging geniality which encouraged widespread participation. The technical resources available to the Assembly meant Commissioners' attendance was recorded during each session, the results of votes were immediately available, and those wanting to speak during a debate had to register their intention and wait to be called on occasions this appeared to slow the debate although it also gave a moment to reflect on the previous speech.
- 7. The matter of civil partnership and same sex marriage hung over the Assembly from the beginning of the week having been on the agenda for most of the last decade. An Overture on the one hand affirmed 'the historic and current doctrine and practice of the Church in relation to human sexuality and their application to the ministers and deacons of the church' but at the same time recognised 'the diversity of views within the Church'. Thus 'In the interests of the peace and unity of the Church' Kirk Sessions would be allowed to depart [from historic practice] 'in order to permit the ordination, induction or appointment of a minister or a deacon who is in a civil partnership'. Presbyteries had discussed and voted on the Overture under the Barrier Act during the past year (31 Approving, 14 Disapproving the members voting 1,381 approving and 1,161 disapproving).
- 8. Contrary opinions were clearly expressed throughout with clarity and passion and I was given the opportunity to contribute to the debate. There were some surprising, even disturbing, comments in relation to the authority of scripture. The idea of recognising a 'mixed economy' in the interests of preserving the unity of the church was strongly advanced. The vote was 309 For 182 Against with 74 Commissioners recording their Dissent. The outworking of this decision will present challenges at local, Presbytery and National level now that each Kirk Session can, with congregational approval, determine whether or not to adhere to the historic doctrine and practice.
- 9. The issue was re-visited, from a different angle, later in the week in a joint report of the Theological Forum and Legal Questions Committee. Although initially presented as a 'tidying up' process to grant equality to Ministers and Deacons in same sex marriages as those in Civil Partnerships this became a long debate. Several Commissioners spoke of the pain the previous decision had caused and I again had the opportunity to contribute to the debate. There was the suggestion that the Church's view and definition of marriage was different from the State's definition and on that basis it would be acceptable to extend equality while retaining the particular theological and ecclesiological nuances. A counter-motion asking for time to reflect on the whole matter so that all members of the Kirk could be involved and the peace of the Church maintained was also discussed. At the vote the Assembly passed the original motion (213 For and 205 Against) and subsequently agreed to remit the matter to Presbyteries under the

Barrier Act. As some of my predecessors have reported there are clear differences on this matter within the Kirk. While the commitment to 'unity of the church' has been called for, for some it is a costly and painful journey.

- 10. Other work of the Assembly is largely reflected in our work in Ireland. The World Mission Council 'seeks to support Congregations and Presbyteries, Councils and Committees to be in the vanguard of involvement with the living stones of the world church.' There was encouragement to be 'open to new areas of partnership in areas of the world where it does not have living links, but where there are strategic opportunities.' There were several opportunities for Delegates and Visitors from other Countries to address the Assembly, those from Syria and Nepal were particularly well received.
- 11. The Scottish Referendum is now past and the undoubted positive contribution of the Church to engage in 'a respectful dialogue' has been widely acknowledged. The outward looking face of the Church was reflected in motions calling for a constitutional convention for England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales to provide better governance and enhanced participation. There was also a call to sister churches to engage in such a process.
- 12. The Social Care Council resources the Church in areas of social care and CrossReach is the agency providing social care services. The work is extensive and varied in what is both a needy and financially challenging environment there was a £1 million operating deficit in the past year. Steps are being taken to achieve a breakeven budget however this focus has frustrated attempts to give cost of living pay rises to staff and move towards paying all employees the Scottish Living Wage. The Council hopes that the four tiers of engagement, 'Prayer', 'Getting Alongside', 'CrossReach Local' and 'CrossReach National' will not only increase awareness of the work but also engagement and support.
- 13. The Ministries Council has initiated a 'Decade for Ministry' with a challenge to increase membership by 100,000 by 2025. The Council also noted that on present trends the Church will be short of over 200 Parish Ministers by the early 2020's, thus a further target was set of training no fewer than 30 candidates for the ministry of word and sacrament each year and no fewer than 100 members through the Mission Shaped Ministry course. A recruitment programme was launched with enthusiasm at the Heart and Soul event. As the Council report states 'A flourishing ministry and a flourishing church are like the chicken and egg it is hard to say which comes first. ... since the two are so interwoven positive action on one should naturally produce positive results on the other.' It will be both interesting and instructive to see how these initiatives develop in the coming years.
- 14. There were many 'fringe meetings' hosted by Councils and Committees to give Commissioners and others a fuller insight into the reports to be presented to the Assembly. These were helpful in getting a feel for the issues and identifying key personnel. The evening receptions enabled us to develop friendships with others from near and far, sharing experiences and insight of mission and ministry.
- 15. It is apparent that both our churches face similar challenges and have opportunities to work together in areas of common concern where we can learn from one another to our mutual advantage and the advancement of Christ's Kingdom.

CHANGES IN THE CODE 2015

ASSEMBLY BUILDINGS, BELFAST, BT1 6DW AUGUST, 2015

The following changes have been made in the 1997 edition of the Code, which should be corrected accordingly.

Trevor D. Gribben Clerk of Assembly

Pars 10-14 of the Code

Delete Pars 10-14 and substitute the following in their place:

- "10. **The Word of God** as set forth in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments is the only infallible rule of faith and practice, and the supreme standard of the Church.
- 11. It is the privilege, right and duty of every person to examine the Scriptures, and each individual is bound to submit to their authority. Having formed a definite conviction as to what the will of God is upon any subject, it is each person's duty to accept and obey it. In exercising this God-given right of private judgment, individual Christians are not to set their reason above the Word of God, or to refuse light from any quarter. Guided by the Holy Spirit, they are to use their reason to ascertain the divine will, as revealed in Scripture, and are to refuse to subject conscience to any authority except that of the Word of God. In the words of the Westminster Confession "God alone is Lord of the conscience, and has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are in anything contrary to His Word, or beside it, in matters of faith or worship."
- 12. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a witness for Christ, has adopted subordinate standards. In these are found what the Church understands the Word of God to teach on certain important points of doctrine and worship. These subordinate standards are a testimony for truth and against error, and serve as a bond of union for members of the Church.
- 13. The Confession of Faith (as approved by the Church of Scotland in her Act of 1647), and the Larger and Shorter Catechisms, prepared by the Westminster Assembly of Divines, are the subordinate standards of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Accepting these subordinate standards, the Church holds that civil rulers must be obedient to Christ in their own area of authority, yet they ought not to attempt, in any way, to constrain any person's religious beliefs or intrude upon their rights of conscience.
- 14. The Church alone has the right to interpret and explain her standards, under the guidance of the Spirit of God." (2015)

Par 23 of the Code

Delete Par 23 and substitute the following in its place:

- "23.(1) **Any Church court may appoint a commission or committee**, the latter being sometimes called a council, for such purposes as the court may determine, or may resolve itself into a committee of the whole court.
- (2) In every case the commission, committee or council shall report to the court.
- (3) Nothing in sub-paragraph (2) shall operate to prejudice any powers conferred on commissions of the Assembly under paragraphs 126-128." (I.A. 2015)

Par 24 of the Code

Delete Par 24 and substitute the following in its place:

- "24. **Rules may make** such provision as the Assembly shall think proper for the holding and functioning of Church courts, including provisions for -
- (a) the appointment, powers and duties of commissions, committees, councils or members or officers of such courts and the fixing of a quorum for, or the appointment of an assessor to, any such court, commission, committee or council:
- (b) the practice and procedure to be followed in or in connection with proceedings before such courts, commissions, committees or councils, or on appeals or references arising therefrom; or
- (c) the records to be kept and reports to be made by such courts, commissions, committees or councils." $(I.A.\ 2015)$

Par 30(1) of the Code

In Par 30(1) add the following words at the end of the paragraph:

"In exercising this leadership the Kirk Session shall oversee and work along with other members who have leadership roles in the congregation." (I.A. 2014. Confirmed 2015)

Par 30(3) of the Code

Delete Par 30(3) and substitute the following in its place:

"(3) In the discharge of their duties each elder should be assigned by the Kirk Session pastoral responsibilities and/or other leadership roles in the congregation." (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 30 of the Code

Following Par 30(3) add a new sub-paragraph:

"(4) The Kirk Session, along with the Minister, should seek to ensure that all elders are equipped to fulfil their duties." (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 35 of the Code

In Par 35 add the following new sub-paragraph and renumber subsequent paragraphs accordingly:

"(b) ensure a scheme for pastoral care is in place in the congregation, in line with current General Assembly guidelines." (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 35 of the Code

In Par 35 add the following new sub-paragraphs:

- "(e) act as the charity trustees of the congregation and be responsible for the congregation's compliance with the requirements of charities legislation in Northern Ireland and/or the Republic of Ireland as appropriate;
- (f) ensure that the Congregational Committee fulfils its duties as delegated to it by the Kirk Session and complies with the decisions of Kirk Session;
- (g) after considering the grounds for disqualification for being a charity trustee under charities legislation in Northern Ireland and/or the Republic of Ireland as appropriate, refer to Presbytery the consideration of removal from office in the congregation of a ruling elder." (I.A. 2015)

Par 47(1)&(2) of the Code

In Par 47 delete Par 47(1)&(2) and substitute the following in their place:

- "(1) The duties of the Congregational Committee, delegated by the Kirk Session, shall be to take care of the poor and administer the temporal affairs of the congregation, and be accountable to the Kirk Session.
 - (2) Those duties shall include -
- (a) administering all funds belonging to the congregation, or held by trustees for its use and apply these funds for the purposes for which they have been created or contributed:
- (b) administering all other property of the congregation, take care to maintain and insure it and take steps to gather funds needed for these purposes;
- (c) having charge of the letting or allocating of seating accommodation in the Church building;
- (d) regulating conditions under which the Church premises, halls or rooms are used, subject to decisions of the Session;
 - (e) promoting the interests of the Central Funds and Missions of the Church;
 - (f) be responsible for appointing or dismissing the sexton;
 - (g) managing the graveyard;
- (h) having power to borrow against any congregational property, with any security required being given by the Congregational Trustees on the instruction of the Congregational Committee and to authorise up to six members of the Congregational Committee to sign any associated documents required by the lender: and
 - (i) carrying out such other functions as may be prescribed." (I.A. 2015)

Par 61(c) of the Code

In Par 61 delete Par 61(c) and substitute the following in its place:

"(c) chaplains to the Forces, ordained ministers and elders serving under the Council for Global Mission and other ministers serving under any Assembly Council in special work outside Ireland, who have been installed or inducted to their charge by Presbytery or have retired from active duty with the consent of the Assembly;" (I.A. 2015)

Par 70 of the Code

In Par 70 add the following new sub-paragraph:

"(d) act as the charity trustees of the Presbytery and be responsible for its compliance with the requirements of charities legislation in Northern Ireland and/or the Republic of Ireland as appropriate." (I.A. 2015)

Par 72(e) of the Code

In Par 72(e) delete the word "deaconesses" and substitute the words "deaconesses, auxiliary ministers". (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 73(b) of the Code

In Par 73(b) delete the word "discharged;" and substitute the words "discharged and that elders are suitably equipped;" (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 74 of the Code

Delete Par 74 and substitute the following in its place:

"74. The Presbytery shall -

- (a) inquire into and deal with reports affecting the character, usefulness or soundness in the faith of ministers in its congregations or in special work under the jurisdiction of the Assembly, and into the character and soundness in the faith of ministers retired or without charge or in work not under the jurisdiction of the Assembly, of deaconesses and auxiliary ministers, and of licentiates and students under its care. In the general case of ministers in special work or of students, the Presbytery shall invite four representatives of the appropriate Assembly Council to sit with them as assessors in the case, who shall for this purpose have the full powers of members of the court. In the special case of theological professors this procedure shall be followed if the College Management Committee, following preliminary investigation, requests the Presbytery to act;
- (b) receive formal charges or complaints against ministers, licentiates, ruling elders, deaconesses or auxiliary ministers, summon witnesses and take evidence in cases of complaint or charge, and pronounce and publish judgment, in accordance with the disciplinary procedures of the Church." (I.A. 2015)

Par 75(a) of the Code

In Par 75(a) delete the words "in cases of difficulty;" and substitute the words "in cases of difficulty and seek conciliation where it is appropriate;" (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 78(b) of the Code

(I.A. 2015)

Par 122 of the Code

"(7) The Trustees shall have Assembly powers to deal with all cases where trustees or others desire to transfer any property, real or personal, to the Trustees of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland under the provisions of the Irish Presbyterian Church Acts, 1871 and 1901 and to accept any such transfer on such terms as it deems expedient."

"(8) The Trustees shall provide for a compilation annually of an abstract of bequests received by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland and an abstract of bequests notified but not yet received." (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 126(4) of the Code

In Par 126(4) delete the word "board" and substitute the word "council". (I.A. 2015)

Par 126(5) of the Code

In Par 126(5) delete the words "the Union Commission and the Commission on Trusts" and substitute the words "and the Union Commission". (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 127(1) of the Code

In Par 127(1) delete the words "the Moderator and Clerk of Assembly and" and substitute the words "the Moderator and Clerk of Assembly, the Convener of the Commission and". (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015).

Par 127(1) of the Code

In Par 127(1) delete the words "Business Board" and substitute the words "Nominations Committee". (I.A. 2015)

Par 127(2)(a) of the Code

In Par 127(2)(a) delete the words "for five years." and substitute the words "for five years and who may be reappointed for one further period of five years." (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 127(2)(b) of the Code

In Par 127(2)(b) delete the words "Business Board" and substitute the words "Nominations Committee". (I.A. 2015)

Par 128 of the Code

Delete Par 128 and substitute the following in its place:

- "128.(1) The Linkage Commission shall consist of:
- (a) The Moderator, and Clerk of the General Assembly; Commission Convener and Secretary; the Deputy Clerk; three representatives of the Council for Mission in Ireland; Conveners of the Commission Panels.
 - (b) One direct nominee from each Presbytery.
 - (c) Ten nominees of the Nominations Committee.
 - (2) Ten members shall form a quorum for the Commission.
- (3)(a) The Commission shall have Assembly powers to determine conditions under which congregations shall be linked, vacant pastorates filled or supplied, associate pastorates established, special ministries provided, auxiliary ministry

posts established, additional pastoral personnel posts authorised and to deal with such other matters as the Assembly may from time to time refer to it. The law of the Church shall apply where relevant to associate ministers where ministers of congregations are referred to but the associate minister shall have no entitlement as such to benefits for the minister in active service.

- (b) The Commission shall approve additional pastoral personnel and auxiliary ministry posts, as appropriate.
- (4) Before any step is taken by a congregation or Presbytery towards filling a vacancy in the pastorate of a congregation, the sanction of the Commission evidenced under the hand of its Convener shall be first obtained.
- (5) Prior to such sanction being given and after consultation with the Presbytery or Presbyteries concerned, the Commission shall go into the merits of the case and decide –
- (a) whether the case is one for continuance, linkage, dissolution, porting or other special provisions as may be appropriate, including dissolution of existing linkages for alternative arrangements;
- (b) what minimum of stipend, Central Ministry Fund contributions, ministerial expenses and other sums shall be paid from local sources or what grants shall be made from central funds;
- (c) what other special terms should be set or arrangements made for leave to call, pulpit supply or pastoral oversight;
 - (d) to what Presbytery a newly linked or ported congregation shall belong.
- (6) Where there is not a vacancy in the pastorate of a congregation, the Commission shall have power –
- (a) upon report from Presbytery or a request from the congregation, to examine the matter and act accordingly;
- (b) to arrange the retirement from active duty or alternative employment of a minister, upon such terms as may be agreed, to facilitate linkage with a vacant congregation;
- (c) where a minister in active duty proposes to undertake additionally a paid public appointment, to examine the proposal and act accordingly so that his duties to the Church shall be discharged and no improper demand made upon the manpower and resources of the Church.
- (7) In congregations and Charges served by ministers under the Home Mission, ordained assistants or other agents of the Church, the Commission shall have power to –
- (a) determine the remuneration of those so serving and allocate the cost among the various funds of the Church;
- (b) determine the contributions to be made by the congregations or charges to various funds of the Church in respect of services received.
- (8) The Commission shall consider church architecture issues and provide for the examination of all plans and proposals for the building, alterations, renovation or demolition of all or part of Churches, Church halls and manses, as well as all proposals and designs for memorials, windows and artificial lighting,

and for the seating and furnishings requisite for the conduct of public worship, observing rules agreed by the General Assembly from time to time." (2015)

Par 130 of the Code

Delete Par 130. (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 132 of the Code

In Par 132 add the following sub-paragraph:

"(4) A court shall always consider the possibility of conciliation before entering into a formal process of discipline." and renumber the subsequent subparagraphs. (I.A. 2014, confirmed 2015)

Par 161(1) of the Code

- (b) prepare and present the annual accounts to the Assembly and nominate auditors for appointment by the Assembly.
- (c) ensure that Councils and officials follow guidelines approved by the Council for the receipt, recording, retention, and payment of monies, and that they provide financial and other information as and when the Council shall require.
- (d) require Councils and officials to obtain the prior approval of the Council before adopting any policy or change of policy affecting the legal status of the Church, a Council, or an official of the Church.
- (e) require Councils and officials to take all steps considered necessary by the Council, for the protection of the assets of the Church against all classes of risk.
- (12) The Council shall, directly or through its appropriate committee, superintend the administration of the Assembly's Incidental Fund, as directed by the Assembly:

- (a) for the payment of travelling expenses, postage, printing and administrative costs in connection with the work of the General Assembly or any of its Councils and Committees.
- (b) for the payment of any other grants or expenses as approved by the General Assembly.
- (c) to obtain the necessary funds by means of an annual assessment levied on congregations, at a rate which shall be fixed by the Assembly annually.
- (d) but shall not be normally chargeable with the expenses of any committee for which the Assembly has made other provisions, as through the United Appeal; nor of members of commissions, councils and committees other than conveners or secretaries, unless by special direction of the Assembly; nor of deputations beyond the limits of the British Isles without the directions of the Assembly or decision of the Council itself.
- (13) The Council shall, directly or through its appropriate committee, be responsible for the regular compilation and publication of Church Statistics as follows:
- (a) it shall prepare and issue annually a query sheet to congregations to ascertain their numerical strength and financial condition together with any additional matters which it may decide. It is the responsibility of each Moderator, or interim Moderator, of Kirk Session, to ensure that all questions are answered and that the query sheets are submitted to Presbytery in time for examination and certification at their stated meeting in March, after which they shall be forwarded to the Council without delay.
- (b) the information thus obtained shall be tabulated and subsequently published by the authority of the Assembly as a supplement to its annual Minutes.
- (14) The Council shall, directly or through its appropriate committee, superintend the management of the Assembly Buildings (including the Assembly Hall) and the Fisherwick Buildings, caring for the fabric, effecting necessary repairs and improvements, arranging lettings of the various halls, rooms, and buildings and maintaining the order and cleanliness of the entire property and be responsible for all matters of health and safety within the buildings.
 - (15) The Council shall, directly or through its appropriate committee:
 - (a) administer The Central Ministry Fund (see Pars 313ff)
 - (b) administer The Retired Ministers Fund (see Pars 321ff)
 - (c) administer The Widows of Ministers Fund (see Pars 324ff)
 - (d) administer The Prolonged Disability Fund
 - (e) administer The Retired Ministers' House Fund (see Pars 319ff)
- (f) appoint a committee to consider and report to the Assembly the cases of all ministers applying for special leave to retire from active duty. The committee shall have the right to issue a schedule of queries to be answered by the applicant.
- (16) The Council shall, directly or through its appropriate committee, administer The Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) Fund (see Pars 318(A)ff) and shall act as scheme employers for the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) or its successors.

- (17) The Council shall have the authority to deal with urgent matters of financial administration, outside the other powers of the Council, which may arise between meetings of the General Assembly.
- (18) The Council, directly or through its appropriate committee, shall prepare the annual United Appeal for mission as follows:
- (a) the accounts of the previous year or an estimate thereof, together with the revised budget for the current year and the budget for the succeeding financial year, shall be submitted to the Council on behalf of the relevant Councils and Committees by the date notified by the Council each year. The Council may also request that longer term projections be prepared where appropriate.
- (b) the Council shall satisfy itself, where necessary by interview with the conveners and others concerned, that the amounts so estimated are justified taking into account the General Assembly's guidelines on Priorities and shall have power to increase or reduce them;
- (c) on the basis of the budgets submitted and approved, the Council shall prepare a United Appeal for the following financial year, for submission to the General Assembly in June of the current year.
- (d) in so doing the Council shall endeavour to secure stability in the finances of organisations of the Church and may accordingly provide for a surplus which shall not exceed five per cent of the total Appeal;
- (e) the Council shall also submit to the Assembly proposals for allocation between the Presbyteries of such proportion of the Appeal as shall appear to the Council to be equitable.
- (19) In preparing the annual United Appeal for mission, the Council, directly or through its appropriate committee, shall carry out its work recognising that:
- (a) Except for ex-officio membership, no convener or secretary of a Council or Committee of the General Assembly whose work is supported by the United Appeal shall be eligible for membership of any committee involved in drawing up the annual appeal and shall not be present for consideration of the annual appeal at the Council itself.
- (b) The General Assembly alone shall have power to include in, or exclude from, the United Appeal any mission, fund, or scheme of the Church, or of Funds or Societies recognised to be organisations of the Church. Such inclusion or exclusion shall normally follow notice of motion received and entered on the books at the Assembly twelve months previously. No mission, scheme or fund whose work is supported by direct assessment shall normally be included.
- (20) After adoption by the Assembly of the United Appeal for mission, with or without amendment:
- (a) it shall become the responsibility of each Presbytery to distribute its proportion of the Appeal equitably among the congregations under its jurisdiction;
- (b) any congregation believing the amount allocated to it to be excessive may appeal to Presbytery;
- (c) when a congregation raises a sum in excess of its allocation it may distribute the excess among the funds of the Church included in the Appeal in such proportion as it thinks fit;

- (d) congregations shall endeavour to transmit all United Appeal contributions received, as soon as practicable to the Church's Financial Secretary and the total amount, in any case, before the 31st December following;
- (e) in the event of the United Appeal not being fully contributed in any year the Council, or its appropriate committee, shall determine the extent to which each Council or Committee due to benefit shall receive funds for its work less than the amounts adopted by the Assembly;
- (f) in the event of an emergency arising which necessitates a special appeal to congregations, the Council, directly or through its appropriate committee, may grant permission for such an appeal to be made and state the conditions upon which it is to be made, but without such permission no special appeal shall be launched by any Council or committee participating in the United Appeal.
- (21) The General Council shall act as charity trustees for the Assembly." (2015)

- (2) Each congregation of the Church shall pay a contribution to the Fund assessed on a basis and at rates determined annually by the General Assembly on the advice of the General Council, or as fixed by the Linkage Commission in giving leave to call in a vacancy. The General Council may apply provisional rates of assessment from the first quarter of each year.
 - (3) Moneys received by the Fund shall also include:
- (a) Income from investments and trust funds, including the Commutation, Sustentation and Augmentation Funds; and other income to which the Central Ministry Fund is, or may become, entitled;
- (b) All donations or bequests for the benefit of the objects of the Fund, which shall, where so directed by the donor or testator, be permanently invested by the Trustees and the income paid to the Fund." (2015)

- (a) to instruct the General Council, or its appropriate committee, to reduce the assessments payable by the congregation in the current financial year;
- (b) to make any appropriate arrangement for future ministry in the congregation;
- (c) to instruct the Presbytery, under Linkage Commission guidelines, to loose the minister from the charge and declare the congregation vacant, prior to a reconfiguration of ministry;
- (d) to make appropriate arrangements for the minister. In so acting, the Linkage Commission shall have power to fix a retiring allowance, according to the rules for the time being of the General Assembly, or to fix an allowance for a temporary period.
- (4) The Linkage Commission shall not give leave to call to any vacant congregation, or linkage, which remains in default to the Central Ministry Fund or other funds of the Church." (2015)
