In a place where Christians are in a minority and being put under increased pressure, how are the local churches coping? What can we in Ireland do to stand with our brothers and sisters in Christ there? What can we learn from them, especially as we prepare to welcome refugees here? Faith in the Furnace Challenges facing the Church in the Middle East

We will hear from Rev Farouk Hammo, Senior Pastor, Baghdad Presbyterian Church, Iraq, whose congregational membership has dropped dramatically due to the violence and persecution of Christians in Iraq over the past ten years. Despite the dangers inside the 'Fiery Furnace,' Rev Farouk plays an important role in caring for the many displaced Christian families driven by IS from Mosul and the surrounding Christian villages.

In the morning, we will also have an opportunity to hear from Rev Uel Marrs, having recently returned from a visit to Lebanon, where he saw how the local church is responding to the crisis, and how refugees fleeing conflict are turning to Christ having 'come through the furnace'.

Faith in the Furnace' is being run in conjunction with Open Doors.



The Refugee Experience Challenges facing the Church at home

In the afternoon, we will hear from Dr Edith Shillue, who works for the Northern Ireland Community of Refugees and Asylum Seekers (NICRAS), who will give an explanation of the asylum and refugee system and processes in the UK, and talk about the experiences of those in the system. Following this, there will be a discussion session on how churches can best help and support new refugees who arrive here.

Edith works in an advisory capacity to the International Meeting Point, 133a Lisburn Road, Belfast.



The two conference sessions are open to anyone with a desire to hear more about these issues, and will include table group discussions, praise and worship, food and fellowship.
